Paddling Muscatine County

Though we don't have the Iowa Great Lakes, or Northeast Iowa vistas, we do have places to enjoy paddle sports close to home in Muscatine County. Depending on your level of experience, or desire for adventure, the Mississippi River, Cedar River, and Deep Lakes Park all provide opportunities for a few hours to a few days' worth of paddling fun.

The Mississippi River has public access at the Clark's Ferry, Shady Creek and Fairport Recreation campgrounds. These are all located above Lock & Dam 16. Muscatine Parks and Recreation maintains the public boat ramp below Lock & Dam 16 at the north end of Riverfront Park. Paddling on the Mississippi is for experienced paddlers. Strong currents, difficult conditions on windy days, and other boating traffic (including barges), requires paddlers to be very aware of their surroundings.

The Cedar River meanders through the central part of Muscatine County from northeast to southwest. The river is wide with numerous sandbars and shallows. The water flow averages about three miles per hour with no whitewater to speak of. It generally is considered an easy "float". Three public access ramps are located at Jack Shuger Memorial Park, Saulsbury Bridge Recreation Area, and McKeown Bridge Access in the north, central, and southern parts of the county.

Though many novice paddlers have successfully made their way down the Cedar River there are challenges. Shallow water can give way to deep (over an adults head) water in just a few feet of downstream travel, and shifting sand can change

the bottom from one trip to the next. Log and brush piles along shorelines are dangerous to boaters and should be avoided when paddling.

Deep Lakes Park and Saulsbury Bridge Recreation Area offer flat-water (lake or pond) paddling opportunities. Saulsbury has Chicken Creek which is an 8-10 acre impounded area as you enter the park. It is an excellent place to try paddling for the first time or to go and practice before a longer more adventurous trip. This is where we take school-aged kids canoeing and where we hold many of our "canoeing and kayaking try-it" events (next one is May 20 from 5:00-7:00 p.m.- more info on page 4).



Deep Lakes Park is located south of Muscatine an area sometimes called the sand pits. The park was once the site of a sand and gravel mining operation, hence the deep lakes. There are 20 named lakes or ponds in the 435-acre park and several more ephemeral or temporary ponds and wetlands. In theory any of the bodies of water could be paddled, but practically only 11 of them

have direct access or can be reached by portaging. These range in size from 55-acre Lake Chester to several 2-4 acres in size. Part of the fun of paddling in this park is working to navigate to some of the harder to reach areas. But even in the easier to reach areas there are many interesting nooks and crannies to explore. Hidden coves, weed beds, clear water, rarely fished shorelines, and agates all can be found in this park.

Safety should be first when paddling. Rivers can be unpredictable. Unseen dangers under the surface like structures (bridges) and log jams, high water, and debris floating with the current all require extra caution. Life jackets should be worn at all times, even when wading. Children 13 years of age and younger are required to wear life jackets, but anyone can be accidentally thrown into the water due to carelessness or as the result of a boating accident.


Other Paddling Tips

- Dress for the weather and water temperature. Wear layers of clothing that can be added or removed during the trip. Bring waterproof or plastic bags to help keep extra clothing dry.
- Always wear shoes. There is a lot of broken glass and pieces of metal especially in the river and on the sandbars. Shoes with backs stay on better than flip flops.
- Be prepared to get wet and possibly dirty!
- Remember that all items not fastened to the boat are at risk of getting lost.
- Bring plenty of water along with your other beverages and snacks. Bring all beverages in non-breakable containers.
- Don't litter! Take a trash bag with you. Trash cans are found at public boat ramps.
- Use sunscreen even on cloudy days.
- Take any allergy or other necessary medications with you. In case of an accident it could be awhile before help arrives to hard-to-access locations.
- Paddling is a physical exercise, and you will have to paddle.
- Respect private property. Much of the land past a sandbar is private property.

- Swimming and wading are not allowed at Deep Lakes Park except at the designated beach area.

No boat to float? No worry!

The Muscatine County Conservation Board has canoes and kayaks which can be rented. Canoes and kayaks can be rented for float trips on the Cedar River. We shuttle you from the Saulsbury Bridge Recreation Area to the launch point in Jack Shuger Memorial Park in Moscow and you float back to Saulsbury. Kayaks can also be rented by the day or weekend and taken to other area lakes or rivers. Look for more information about our rentals at www.muscatinecountyconservation.com.





Creature Feature

American Robin

Welcome, welcome, little stranger,
Fear no harm, and fear no danger;
We are glad to see you here,
For you sing "Sweet Spring is near."
~Louisa May Alcott, "To The First Robin," 1840

Seeing that first robin of the year has long been a sign that spring is here, with the notion that the robin came back from somewhere warm. But, in reality it's probably been here all along. Most robins who live south of Canada don't migrate, but spend most of the winter roosting in trees in wooded areas with lots of berry-producing trees and shrubs.

The American Robin, a member of the Thrush family, is one of the larger songbirds at nine to eleven inches. They live in all kinds of habitats including; yards, fields, parks, woodlands, forests, tundra, and even in the mountains up to the treeline.

American Robins eat invertebrates such as earth worms, insects, snails, and a variety of berries. During warm weather the old saying "the early bird catches the worm" may hold a little truth as worms are usually on the menu early in the day with berries and insects later on.

Females choose the nest site and also do all of the construction. Nests are typically built in the lower part of a tree on a horizontal branch. Robins don't seem to be bothered by human activity as they will also build nests in gutters, eaves, outdoor light fixtures, and other structures. Dead grass and small twigs are used to make a cup-shaped nest then it is covered with soft mud. The nest is lined with fine dry grass. Males are quick to defend the nest often dive bombing an intruder to draw attention away from it.

Robins may produce two or three broods each season. Three to eight pale blue eggs are laid and the female incubates them for 12-14 days. After hatching the nestlings are fed for 14-16 days by both parents before fledging (leaving the nest).

At this time the young are just learning to fly so are often seen hopping around on the ground and trying to fly onto low branches, but the parents are still looking after them. About two weeks after fledging the young robins can fly and are on their own.

Robin eggs and nestlings are eaten by snakes, squirrels, blue jays and crows. Adults are preyed on by raptors, cats, and snakes. Robins are also vulnerable to pesticide poisoning due to foraging on lawns. Robins live an average of two years, but the oldest robin recorded lived for almost fourteen years.




Fun Facts

- During the winter robin roosts can contain 250,000 birds.
- Robins have been the inspiration for many poems, songs, and even a comic book hero.
- In Native American mythology the robin got its red breast by fanning the flames of a dying fire to save a man and boy.


SPRING
