Muscatine: County Conservation Board 2008 At a Glance

Mother Nature Dominates

Last year 2008, was anything but typical for the Muscatine County Conservation Board. It started out as most other years with staff spending many of the cold months developing and constructing new displays for the Environmental Learning Center, and planning programs for the busy spring field trip season and summer nature camps.

Spring arrived and education staff was busy with field trips to Discovery Park, the Saulsbury Bridge Recreation Area, Wild Cat Den, and other natural areas in Muscatine County.

Operations staff began to get the campgrounds, picnic areas and trails ready for use when the warm weather would finally set in.

The new shower/restroom building construction in the main campground at Saulsbury was well underway with plans for it to open along with the campground.

The campgrounds opened on schedule (the shower/restroom building did not) and were open for several weeks before a spring flood closed them. We managed to get in another couple of weeks of camping before they were closed again by an all-time record flood on the Cedar River.

Saulsbury Road was damaged by the flood and closed to the public until it was repaired in October. The campground and shower building opened in October for a few weeks before closing up for the winter.

On top of the flood, a big windstorm swept through the area in late July destroying or damaging numerous trees at Saulsbury plus a few at Discovery Park adding more clean up work mostly at Saulsbury.

Despite Mother Nature, things ran pretty much as usual at Discovery Park

and the Environmental Learning Center. Summer camps and other programs went on as usual, with the exception of canoe camps. No canoes went out all summer because of the flooding, although the Muscatine High School's outdoor recreation classes were able to canoe in the fall.

Flood and storm clean up continued throughout the fall and winter, but the majority of the work is finished. After last year we hope that 2009 is nothing like last year and look forward to things getting back to normal.


We have been able to open and develop Discovery Park with the assistance of many in the public and private sector, as well as the solid support from the County Board of Supervisors.

We have been able to recover from last year's horrible flooding and damage and will be offering better services at Saulsbury than we had before.

We are positioned appropriately to take advantage of any opportunity that may arise to expand our service. Even with an eye toward our fiscal restraints, our staff has been working hard to improve the programs we offer. The board members and our staff have worked hard to limit the use of tax money and instead utilize as much non-tax funding as possible.

I encourage you to go out and take a look at your county conservation areas. Most people in our community are familiar with our naturalists, who provide programs at many different sites, but many people forget about our natural areas. A trip to Saulsbury, Discovery Park, or one of the smaller properties will bring you closer to nature and give you an opportunity to be refreshed.

Revenue in the first half of 2008 was down significantly due to the flooding. The campgrounds were only open for several weeks, very few canoes were rented, and a several summer nature camps were cancelled.

Environmental Learning Center

In 2008, more than 5,400 visitors (not including people who participated in our programs) came to the Environmental Learning Center to view the exhibits, including two travelling exhibits.

"A Salute to Songbirds" was on display from late April through the end of June.

"PROJECT InSECT" also displayed its live insect zoo from May through June.

Education Programs
In 2008, Conservation Board Staff gave
443 programs to 11,016 people. More
than three-quarters of the programs
were presented to children ranging
in age from 18 months through high
school. Almost half of those programs
were given at the Environmental Learning Center and Discovery Park.


Nature hikes, fishing, canoeing, survival, animals, habitats, and geocaching were just a handful of the many programs presented to children.

Bird watching and feeding, native plants, basket weaving, and "green" building were among the programs presented to adults.

Some of the weekend programs held were Pond Study, Bluebirds, Nature Crafts, Storytelling, and Edible Insects.



Conservation Corps In the summer of 2008, the Conservation Board hired ten youth ages 16-18 and two crew leaders for the Muscatine Youth Conservation Corps program.

The program is funded entirely with donations from local industries, businesses, organizations, government entities, and individuals.
