Ambassador Animals for Education

Muscatine County Conservation has several co-workers who help us share the love of nature and conservation with audiences big and small, young and old. These teammates may be covered in scales, feathers, fins, shells, fur, or exoskeletons.

We are excited to introduce you to one of our newest animal ambassadors, a gray morph screech owl named Asio (right). Asio has a home in the raptor exhibit behind the Learning Center where she relaxes between programs. We have 4 raptors.



Other ambassador animals you might meet include Louie the speckled prairie kingsnake (left) and Kajika the fox snake (right). We have 5 snakes, and 3 of them need names!



Two aquariums full of fish are a constant source of relaxation and entertainment. Bobbie the black crappie (below) demonstrates swimming maneuvers.

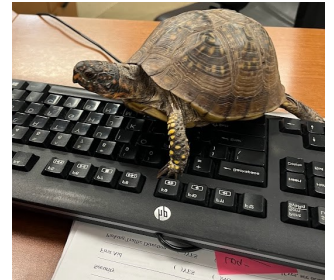


Sheldon the softshell (right) more closely resembles a pancake than a turtle. Two other aquatic turtles share the aquarium space next to him.

FY24 Annual Report - Highlights

The Staff and Conservation Board are so thankful for the support of so many community members who love and enjoy attending programs and spending time in their county parks and wildlife areas. Here are a few of the highlights.

- Three long-time staff members retired, and new faces are now serving the residents of Muscatine County.
- Naturalists and externs gave a total of 832 EE programs with a total of 16,670 in attendance.
- The ELC was visited by over 6,000 people and an additional 3,592 guests attended the 234 programs held in the park.
- Park Rangers and maintenance staff worked hard to keep the parks safe, restrooms cleaned, and natural areas looking fantastic!
- Saulsbury Campground did experience some flooding the end of May-June, but still managed to have 1,690 camper use nights and bring in over \$30,000 in revenue.
- Saulsbury Lodge was rented by 70 groups including baby showers, scout groups, family reunions, grad parties, weddings and more.
- 153 groups enjoyed the cabins at Deep Lakes Park, bringing in over \$42,000 in revenue.
- An Iowa DNR Community Forestry Grant helped to plant trees that had been destroyed by the Derecho at Saulsbury and in the Muscatine Arboretum at Discovery Park.
- Multiple volunteer groups helped to weed flower beds, pick up litter in the parks, and plant trees.

Area Spotlight: Deep Lakes Park

Deep Lakes Park is Muscatine County Conservation's newest park. This 435-acre sand and gravel quarry features over 120-acres of clear water lakes of varying sizes and depths.

The area was donated by W.G. Block Company in December of 2012. Since then, the Conservation Board and staff have been busy making improvements for public access.

The area is open to fishing, paddling, boating (trolling motors only), nature exploration, and swimming in the designated beach area ONLY.

The Main Access is located on the South side of Muscatine, at 2552 Pettibone Avenue. It provides access to Lake Chester, the biggest lake, where the swimming beach, boat landing, accessible fishing dock, and cabins are located.

Three parking areas are located along 41st street. One features a small picnic gazebo, two offer access to the hard-surface biking/walking trail.

Two more access points are located along 57th street. One is at the bicycle trailhead and the other is a small parking area with a boat access to Lake Jewel & Lake Violet.

There is an access on Stewart Road with walk in trails to Lake Patricia or Island Lake.

A hard-surfaced bicycle/walking trail z's for 1.4-miles (one-way) through the park stretching from 57th street to 41st. It passes picturesque lakes, sand dunes, summer wildflowers, the cabins, and the gazebo before connecting to the Greater Muscatine Trail System at the corner of Stewart Road and 41st.

There are 4 reservable cabins

at Deep Lakes Park. Check our website for availability or call the office.

Visitors can rent kayaks for paddling at Deep Lakes Park. They must be reserved at least 3-days in advance.

Future plans for Deep Lakes Park include building a campground on the North side of the park. We hope to begin construction for Phase 1 in 2025. This will include construction of an access road and 25 full-hook-up sites (electricity, sewer, & water), plus a modern shower house.

Phase 2 will include building a playground in the campground, and the addition of up to 25 more campsites. The Master Plan also includes space for the addition of 3 or 4 more cabins. Due to the popularity of the 4 cabins we currently have, there is a good chance they could become Phase 3.



Make the Most of Fall!

Fall means cooler temperatures and shorter days. The greens of summer turn to various shades of vibrant reds, oranges, yellows, and browns. It is a great time to spend outdoors, enjoying the weather and natural beauty.

Here are a few ways to boost your mental health, breathe in some fresh air, absorb some vitamin D, and make memories with family and friends:

1. **Go Hunting** - Hunting is allowed at Cedar Bluffs, Richardson, Shield Prairie, Pike Run, and Saulsbury. Some of the most popular game species includes deer, pheasant, rabbit, squirrel, ducks, and geese!
2. **Drop a Line** - As the old saying goes, "A bad day fishing still beats a good day in the office!" Easy access pond fishing is available at Discovery Park. Deep Lakes, Gedney Lake, and Saulsbury also offer great fishing options.
3. **Enjoy a Couple Nights Away** - Rent a cabin at Deep Lakes Park or go camping at Saulsbury Bridge Recreation Area. There are so many ways to enjoy nature while you are there!
4. **Paddle** - Canoe shuttles are available on the Cedar River from Jack Shuger in Moscow to Saulsbury. You can also rent a kayak to paddle at Deep Lakes or haul it to your favorite paddling location.
5. **Picnics in the Park** - No matter if your idea of a picnic is tossing down a blanket and opening the basket of food or reserving a shelter and catering in a buffet, we have the space for you! There are playgrounds near several of our shelters to entertain your younger guests as well.
6. **Hit the Trails** - There are paved hiking/biking trails at Discovery Park and Deep Lakes Park. Saulsbury, Pike Run, and Cedar Bluff all have natural surfaced, mowed trails to explore as well. If you have horses, riding is allowed on the trails at Saulsbury!
7. **Hone in on History** - The Old Barn at Discover Park will take you back to the old farming days, or maybe you want to check out Nye Cemetery, the final resting place of Benjamin Nye who is credited with being the first settler in Muscatine County. Fun fact, he also starting the Pine Grist Mill at Wildcat Den State Park, which is adjacent to the Cemetery.
8. **Attend a Program or Event** - Check out all the events listed in this newsletter and join us on an adventure!
9. **Fall Colors** - The Muscatine Arboretum at Discovery Park is an awesome place to view fall colors. The diversity of trees leads to a beautiful array of colors, shapes, and sizes throughout the season. Saulsbury and Shield Prairie are also great places to view an array of fall colors.
10. **Visit the Environmental Learning Center** - The ELC is open daily with free admission. It is always fun to watch the fish swimming in the aquariums, the snakes hiding in their enrichment materials, and the raptors on their perch.

Prairie Seed Harvest **Saturday, October 5** **9:00 am - 1:00 pm** **Discovery Park**

Help make Muscatine County more beautiful and pollinator-friendly through seed propagation. We'll discuss how to identify, collect, and store select wildflower seeds for future planting. We will be walking through tallgrass prairie, so please dress in pants and close-toed shoes. Long-sleeves may make you more comfortable, as well. Snacks will be provided, but feel free to bring a sack lunch to enjoy outdoors. Children under 13 must be accompanied by adult. Please meet by Environmental Learning Center entrance by 9am.

Halloween at Saulsbury **Saturday, October 17** **6:30 pm - 8:00 pm** **Saulsbury Bridge Rec. Area**



Enjoy a Halloween Drive-Thru the campground. Campers will have their sites decorated with a spooky (not scary) Halloween theme. This event is very accessible, since guests will remain in their cars for the tour. There is a suggested donation of \$10/vehicle with proceeds going to the Muscatine County Conservation Foundation. The first 300 children, ages 2-12, will receive a treat bag. Volunteers & treat bag donations needed.



Trout Stocking **Saturday, October 26** **12:00 pm** **Discovery Park**

The Iowa DNR will be stocking rainbow trout at Discovery Pond (the front one near Cedar Street) at noon. There will be around 100 tagged fish. The first 20 tagged fish, turned in will receive a gift card. In order to fish for trout, you must have a valid Iowa fishing license, AND a trout stamp. Fish can either be turned in to a Ranger on Duty, or bring your fish to the Environmental Learning Center during open hours: noon-4pm on Saturdays and Sundays; or Monday - Friday from 8am-4:30 pm.
